McILROY ON A MISSION TO WIN

After three runners-up finishes at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship and once again playing with his father Gerry, the world No 2 is aiming for victory at the tournament that launched his professional career as a teenager 12 years ago

ory McIlroy tees off at Carnoustie this morning hoping by Sunday to have filled a gap in his trophy cabinet.

The World No 2 has finished runner-up three times in the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship - in 2009, 2011 and 2014 - and says it's about time for a victory.

"I've come very close a few times and it would mean a lot to me. With a bit of luck, maybe I can finally win it this year."

Buoyed by his Tour Championship and FedEx Cup wins last month, McIlroy will also have the inspirational support of dad Gerry, who will be playing alongside him in the Team Championship.

He said: "I'm really looking forward to it. I love links golf and the three courses we play. It's great fun playing with my dad. He has been such a rock for me over

Rory has had a close relationship with the Championship over the years. In 2007, aged 18, he became the youngest player to earn a European Tour card from tournament play when he finished third.

The Championship, a celebration of links golf at its finest, is staged over the Old Course St Andrews, Carnoustie and Kingsbarns.

To win, Rory will have to beat the strongest field ever, which includes World No 4 Justin Rose, World No 6 Jon Rahm, Open champion Shane Lowry, recent BMW PGA winner Danny Willett and a formidable line-up of Major champions, such as Ernie Els, Padraig Harrington, Martin Kaymer and Graeme McDowell.

Also in the field are defending champion Lucas Bjerregaard, last year's runner-up Tommy Fleetwood and two-time winner Tyrrell

This is the 35th year that Alfred Dunhill has supported golf at St Andrews, through the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship and previously the Alfred Dunhill Cup. Since the creation of the Alfred Dunhill Links Foundation in 2011 more than £7million has been raised for charity.





TEAM JUSTINS OFF AND RUNNING

'Justin (Timberlake) is always competitive, typically when his shot comes around he tends to bring out his best stuff' says World No 4 Justin (Rose)

ustin Rose is excited to be back playing at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship for the first time in over a decade. The Englishman's last appearance was back in 2008 and this year he has returned with a bang, teaming up with superstar singer and actor Justin Timberlake in the Team Championship.

"I can't believe it's been so long," he said. "It is amazing how time flies but I'm excited. It feels like it's a really nice time of year to play here again.

"You've got to embrace the fun of this week – I think that's the beauty of these tournaments. If you go into it with a good attitude and have conversations off the ball, then I think that helps."

Rose has previously played with his namesake Justin Timberlake – pictured right earlier this week during a practice round at Carnoustie, taking on the Spectacles bunkers at the 14th hole – at the AT&T pro-am at Pebble Beach. It was there that they first came up with the idea of teaming up in St Andrews. Timberlake finished a 13-month tour of his latest album, Man of the Woods, in April and the opportunity to reform their double act in Scotland emerged.

"It's cool to be playing with

Justin," said Rose. "We've done the AT&T a couple of times together and floated the idea of doing this one a couple years ago. He's touring a lot but this year it worked for both of us to come and play.

"He got into town on Saturday. He's played a few practice rounds and really enjoyed it. We've done the team building, the team bonding and now we're going to do the team scoring, so we're excited to get out there."

Rose admits he has been impressed with Timberlake's golf game. "I teed off with him early in their practice round. He drove one of the greens early in the round. With the right wind and the right time, he should be able to make a few birdies

"The thing about Justin is that he's always so competitive. Typically, when his shot comes around, he tends to bring his best stuff."

Of the three courses at the Alfred Dunhill Links – St Andrews, Kingsbarns and Carnoustie – Rose is most wary of Carnoustie. "It is the one that has the least room off the tee. It's the most well-bunkered and the one you have to play the most conventionally.

"St Andrews, you can always bail out to the left. Kingsbarns is quite wide. There's opportunity to miss a shot there and get away with it."





JACK'S THE LAD FOR STEPHEN AFTER INDIAN OPEN VICTORY

Fifteen years after becoming Alfred Dunhill Links champion, Stephen Gallacher has his 18-year-old son as caddie, making his latest title his 'greatest achievement in golf'

tephen Gallacher is hoping to repeat his 2004 Alfred Dunhill Links Championship victory – this time with his son Jack as his caddie.

Gallacher junior was too young to remember that breakthrough European Tour win 15 years ago, but the 18-year-old has now been successfully carrying his dad's bag for over a year.

"I was looking for a caddie and Jack has been around golf all his life," explained Gallacher.

"The only thing I wondered about was the physical aspect of it and whether he could cope with it,

but we put him on a fitness regime and he's loving it. He started in mid-2018 and in his 18th or 19th event we managed to get a victory – at the Hero Indian Open [in March 2019] – which was my greatest achievement in golf, to have my son on the bag."

Gallacher fondly recalls his



2004 victory. "I ended up tying with Graeme [McDowell] and playing a playoff. Both of us hit good shots down the middle and unfortunately Graeme was in a divot. He hit in the burn and I knocked it stiff.

"It was my first victory and it was a long time coming, but it couldn't have been anywhere better than the Home of Golf."

Jack, a one handicapper, has relished the experience of carrying his dad's bag. "My course management has always been good which is the most important thing for being a caddie," he said. "You are learning on the job and I am on the line as much as he is."





TEAM TITLE IS THE TOP PRIORITY FOR SHANE

hane revealed his main ambition this week is to win the Team Championship. The Open champion has partnered with Gerry McManus - brother of businessman and racehorse owner JP McManus - in 10 of the 11 years he has competed at the tournament and a joint victory would mean more to Lowry than a third European Tour title of 2019.

"I would obviously love to win the tournament as an individual, but I would give anything to win as a team, for Gerry," said Lowry, who had that prize in his sights on the final round six years ago.

"We had a chance to win in 2013. We were two ahead in the Team Championship but I played a bad last five holes and we lost by a shot, so that was hard to take.

"It would be great to win the Team Championship.I'll be reading Gerry's putts and trying my best for him to shoot the lowest scores we can. We keep in touch and I see him four or five times a year, whether it's in Ireland or outside of Ireland. We have a friendship."

World No 6 Jon Rahm will be playing with his father Edorta, who brought him to St Andrews for the first time when he was four.

He said: "Both my parents have done so much for me related to golf, it's great to be able to do something for him. It was a Christmas present."



FRIENDLY FORMAT IS BIG DRAW FOR TOMMY

ommy Fleetwood says the camaraderie between professional players and their amateur partners makes the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship "a very special week".

The Ryder Cup star finished tied second in last year's individual event, matching his result in 2014.

He said: "I have been very lucky with my partners, including being paired with Ogden Phipps for the last few years. I've also played with Tim Henman and Harry van Dyk. I've really enjoyed every single one I've played in, and it's great to come back and know you are going to have such a good time.

"The Old Course is my favourite golf course in the world, but it is the unique format and the camaraderie with the amateurs which makes it a very special week. Players and amateurs hang out together, which is great."

The Alfred Dunhill Links Championship celebrates links golf at its finest and is played over the Old Course at St Andrews, the Championship Course at Carnoustie and Kingsbarns Golf Links. The final round, after the cut is made on Saturday, is played over the Old Course.

With a total prize fund of US\$5million, there are two separate competitions - an individual professional tournament and a Team Championship, in which each professional is paired with an amateur.



CHASING A MOMENT OF HISTORY...

adraig Harrington will be putting his responsibilities as European Ryder Cup captain on hold for the week as he tries to win a historic record third Alfred Dunhill Links. "I've been lucky enough to win twice. It's definitely the favourite tournament of the year for me and many players. The three courses suit me down to the ground," said Padraig.



PLAYING WITH PRO'S WORKS FOR WARNE

The Australian cricket legend is part of a fun group that comes alive around the Dunhill Links Championship

hane Warne has likened playing in the Alfred Dunhill Links as akin to an amateur cricketer getting to take part in a high-profile Test match.

"I don't think there's any sport quite like golf in the way it allows amateur players like us to tee it up alongside the professionals," said the cricket legend. "There's no other sport where the amateur can compete with the pro. No one can just play at the Melbourne Cricket Ground in front of 90,000 people in a Boxing Day Test. Yes, you can play in a charity cricket match but it's not the same.

"Here, for amateur golfers like us, it's the best week of the year. There's a great camaraderie between the regular group of amateurs and we talk about this tournament all year. We have a WhatsApp group and, when you get your invitation, it's always a thrill.

"I've been lucky in that I've played with Ryan Fox for the last couple of years and he's my partner again this time. We get on great, and there are also quite a few cricketers in the field again and we always have our own little competitions. AB de Villiers playing for the first time this year just adds to that group."



HOW KINGSBARNS GOT ITS HOOKS INTO FINAU

ony Finau has set his sights on becoming the first US winner of the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship.

He said: "I came here last year for the first time and enjoyed it so much that I'm back. The courses are hard to beat.

"Kingsbarns is my favourite links course in the world, after playing it last year. I couldn't believe how good the views were and how good the course was."

Finau is also looking forward to playing in the same group as Hollywood actor Justin Timberlake.

"I've never played with Justin Timberlake," he added. "That will be a cool thing for me. I was a huge NSYNC fan growing up. It's going to be fun to get to know him better and his golf game."

"As we both know, when you're touring it's really hard to get your clubs out," said Simpson.

"If we're going to get a chance to play then I will take them," said Farrell. "On tour I've had the chance to play golf in some places that I never would have played otherwise."

"Absolutely," agreed Simpson.
"We've had rounds in Singapore and Tokyo and it's unbelievable, it's really cool."

The two musicians play together today at StAndrews. Simpson plays with Tom Sloman, while Farrell partners Edoardo Molinari.



BROTHERLY ACT

ctor Luke Wilson hopes that putting competitions with big brother and fellow actor, Owen, can inspire him to make the cut for the first time at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship.

"Owen doesn't play golf, though he is really into putting," explained the star of movies such as The Royal Tenenbaums and Old School.

"He's got a little putting green

in his house. We have big-time competitions and golf is set up for some good gambling."

Wilson, pictured above with fellow actor Greg Kinnear, plays at St Andrews with Andrew 'Beef' Johnston today. He has yet to tee it up on the final day, despite a near miss in 2018.

He said: "I had a great round going and then double bogeyed the Road Hole and bogeyed 18. I shot a 78 which for me was great, but we missed the cut."





RUUD RECALLS RYDER CUP CHEERS

t may be the 16th time that football legend Ruud Gullit has appeared in the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship, but he still remembers vividly his first appearance in 2002.

"There have been so many highlights over the years," said the former Holland, AC Milan and Chelsea star, "but perhaps the best of all was finding myself playing in the same group as Lee Westwood and Darren Clarke in 2002, just after they had been on the winning European Ryder Cup team at The Belfry. Just being alongside them in that tournament and experiencing all the crowds cheering was fantastic.

"It's quite an honour to be here, every time I play. It's an unbelievable feeling to play at the Dunhill."


The competition has been held since 2002 and this year featured the biggest field ever, with boys and girls from 47 different schools

in Angus and Fife. It is part of Alfred Dunhill's continuing commitment to support young golfers.


